

BURLINGTON CITY COUNCIL REGULAR SESSION MARCH 2, 2016

City of Burlington Governing Body met in Regular Session at City Hall, 301 Neosho Street, Burlington, Kansas at 6:00 p.m. Wednesday, March 2, 2016. Mayor Stan Luke called the meeting to order.

AGENDA: *Council Member Curtiss stated, "I move to approve the amended agenda." Council Member Lenard, "Second." Motion unanimously carried.*

MINUTES: February 17, 2016: *Council Member Griffith moved to accept the Draft Minutes of regular session February 17, 2016 as presented. Council Member Tschantz, "Second" Motion unanimously carried.*

APPOINTMENT: Mike Skillman, Fair Board Request - Spring Demolition Derby in Kelley Park 3-26-2016

Mike Skillman addressed Council, "I am here to ask permission to use Kelley Park for the Spring Demolition Derby. We set the Derby for Saturday, March 26th. I know it's Easter weekend, and it sounds a little funky I know; but the way it is scheduled with a lot of other stuff going on, it is actually working out really good in the derby world - if we can get your permission to use the facilities. The Fair Board will take care of everything like we normally do as far as setting up, cleaning up, and everything. I still need to get with Sharon Henry because she has something going on down there, and I will work it out with her. I know she is worried I'm going to leave it muddy or something." Mayor Luke told him Sharon Henry's event is the BHS SADD Mock Disaster. Mr. Skillman stated, "I'll make sure it's cleaned up, dried up. They're talking rain, but we'll scrape it out and do whatever we have to."

Mayor Luke, "Kevin?" Superintendent Boyce stated, "The only thing I have to say is we've had trouble with the blocks not being put back in place against the fence. I ask that we put a timeframe on that; and if it's not met, then they're not given permission to do it again." Mr. Skillman said, "That's on me, okay. I'll take the blame for that because I get to going, and there is so much stuff going on during the Fair that I don't get them moved out of there because other people are doing things. With this one in the spring, we're the only thing down there; so as soon as we're done, we'll clean up. The derby will be over early, and we'll have equipment there and clean up. I'll get the blocks moved back, I promise. That is totally on me. I know what Kevin is talking about." Mayor Luke mentioned that the Mock Disaster is on April 12th, the Recreation Center starts putting up their fences and stuff for baseball and softball; and it creates an issue if it's not done. Mr. Skillman, "I've already dealt with Scot Jeffers on that. I'm on the Recreation Board, so I know what's going on there and I've got that under control." He knows Superintendent Boyce has a legitimate complaint. Council Member Griffith inquired whether construction of a building in the park will interfere. It won't.

Council Member Scothorn, "What's a reasonable timeframe, Mike, for you to have those out of there?" Mr. Skillman, "We'll have it out of there that same weekend because we'll have enough equipment down there. Our plans are: we're going down on Friday; we'll set the blocks up prior, so I can hopefully get Alan's crew (Electric Department) down there several days ahead of time to cable. As soon as it's done, we can take the cable down and roll it up like we've done before, so all Alan will have to do is pick up his cable and stuff." Superintendent Schneider inquired, "With that being said, Mike, when are you setting up the blocks?" Mr. Skillman, "I'll set them up a week ahead of time, or whatever we've got to do." Superintendent Schneider, "Okay, just get with me. It's hard if we get notice on a Friday - it's happened to me once or twice." Mr. Skillman apologized for that (giving short notice). Superintendent Schneider, "We're happy to do it. Just give me some notice."

Mr. Skillman said, "I've tried staying out of this stuff for twenty-some years and let other people deal with it. Now all of a sudden, I'm the one running it." He added, "If there are any questions, you can contact me directly. If you need my email address or phone number, I'll give it to you. If I can get your permission, it would be greatly appreciated."

Mayor Luke stated, "Why don't we set it at 72 hours if it's dry, to get stuff out of there - just in case something comes up on Saturday; and we'll set it a week if it's raining that weekend - that way there's a chance for it to dry a little before you go in there. We'll set those two timelines." Mr. Skillman, "That's fine with me."

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Council Member Curtiss stated, "I move to grant Mike Skillman's request on behalf of the Coffey County Fair Association, to hold the Spring Demolition Derby in Kelley Park on March 26, 2016, with the condition that cleanup is to be done within seventy-two (72) hours if the weather is okay, and within one week's time if it is rainy." Council Member Scothorn, "I'll second." Mayor Luke called for discussion. Chief Jones stated, "I had been requested by Mrs. Henry to express her concern because the Mock Disaster. but I think Mike (Mr. Skillman) has already addressed everything I could have mentioned. **Hearing no further discussion, Mayor Luke called for a vote. Motion unanimously carried, 6:0.** Mr. Skillman, "Thank you, folks. I appreciate it."

APPOINTMENT: Proclamation Presentation to Colby Johnson, 2016 KSHSAA 4A Wrestling Champion

Mayor Luke stated, "We have the privilege this evening to recognize one of our high school students. It's only a proclamation; we would have done a key to the city, but we ordered some in 2010 - they haven't arrived yet." Mayor Luke requested Colby Johnson, a BHS Junior, to come forward. He then read the Proclamation which was prepared in honor of Colby's winning First Place in the 2016 Kansas High School Activities Association 4A Champion - 138 pounds. The week of March 10 through 17 was thereby proclaimed to be BHS State Wrestling Championship Week in Burlington, Kansas. Pictures were taken, and spectators applauded.

Mayor Luke asked Colby if he had anything he wanted to say. Colby said, "Thank you to all my coaches and everyone who got me as far as I can. I couldn't have done it without any of them, and my practice partners; and my parents for taking me everywhere and being there for me." Council Member Griffith, "You make us proud." Council Member Curtiss, "Congratulations!" More pictures. More applause. After giving copies of the proclamation to Coach Vander Linden - one for him, one for Colby's parents, and one for Assistant Coach Emling, Mayor Luke invited all of them to stay for the rest of the meeting; however, after thanking everyone, they chose to leave.

PUBLIC COMMENTS: Kent Fahnholz, Key Equipment & Supply-Request to Bid on Street Sweeper

Kent Fahnholz, on behalf of Key Equipment & Supply, addressed Council, "I'm not quite as exciting as the State Champion, but thank you all for giving me the floor for just a few minutes. Every day you are tasked with making choices with the public trust. Those choices don't come lightly. It takes a lot of time to go through; and while due diligence is kind of time consuming, but is necessary when we're spending \$150,000 to \$250,000 on a piece of equipment to maintain your infrastructure."

"As one of the largest dealers selling street sweepers in the state of Kansas - we also cover a three or four state territory, it is imperative to us that we support our local communities; and as a Kansas resident, it's important to keep that business home. We do have a business in Kansas City, Kansas. We have road service. We have many employees and their families, which we help to support. Keeping that business home is important. I think you all know the current state of the budget in Kansas, and keeping that revenue home is very very important to all of us - keep those coffers stocked."

"What I'm really talking about is you're making a decision on a machine that's going to be maybe ten to fifteen plus years to maintain your infrastructure. It's probably a good idea to do an absolute thorough investigation of what all is out there; not only on price, but productivity, longevity, the dealer standing behind it - is he going to be able to show up and support that product later on down the road, whether it be eight months or eight years, whatever the case may be. We also offer a trade-in program. I know you've currently got a Tennant. I love used equipment. There are cities throughout the state of Kansas that are looking for good used equipment when they cannot afford to buy new - similar to what you guys are getting ready to do."

Mr. Fahnholz continued, "I did have an opportunity to present some of my equipment. For that, obviously I will take the blame for not being more proactive. I was here in September (2015), and kind of thought the process was actually a little slower than what thought. That's my fault, that's on me. I would like the opportunity to bring in a machine. We didn't get a bid (invitation); I didn't know how it was going; and I didn't get a chance to bid as well - to provide one. We sell sweepers all over the state of Kansas; all over the state of Missouri; to KDOT and to KTA. It's with a great sense of pride we represent a company that's American made, they're in Elgin, Illinois over the past one-hundred years, we're a fifty year old company, and including this year we've been in the state of Kansas twenty-nine plus."

Mr. Fahnholz stated, "I know you've been out for bids. I know you're probably getting ready to read the bids tonight on the street sweeper and make a decision. I just ask that - it's not going to cost you a darn thing to table that decision for a few weeks - you let us bring in a machine of your choosing - we have nine different models, plus a couple more with enhancements. We can come in and maybe do a head to head and give you an opportunity to really take a peek at something that's a heavy industrial street sweeper, different than what you're getting ready to purchase on a small scale; and really know that you've put your best foot forward to give the citizens of Burlington the best piece of equipment that is not only the most cost effective, but the most productive and something that's going to last for quite a while. That's all; just in closing, I wish for the opportunity. I thank you for letting me speak tonight." He added, "I have some information here I'd like to leave later on." At the Mayor's direction, he gave the information to Mark Davidson, Street Department Foreman.

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STREET DEPARTMENT: Street Sweeper - Bids

Council Member Curtiss stated, "I move to accept the bids for a street sweeper as bona fide." Council Member Lenard, "Second." Hearing no discussion, Mayor Luke called for a vote. Motion unanimously carried, 6:0.

Council Member Curtiss stated, "I move to table discussion on the street sweeper until March 16, 2016." She asked if that was enough time. Mayor Luke said, "It's two weeks." Council Member Scothorn, "Second." Mayor Luke called for discussion; hearing none he called for a vote. Motion unanimously carried."

ELECTRIC DEPARTMENT: Distribution Updates

General: Electric personnel are doing daily work orders, line locates, and customer service requests.

4th and Cross - Crosswalk Signals: Electric personnel repaired some malfunctioning crosswalk buttons at the stoplights on 4th & Cross.

Electric Services: The Electric Department put in new service for a house under construction at the south end of town. Since last council, we repaired an older customer service in that end of town as well; when they get that age they fail.

Power Outages: Superintendent Schneider said, "We had two call-outs for minor outages since last council. One was a simple stoplight bulb out at the intersection of 4th and Neosho. Those outages go in spurts and not only take the men away from their families or activities, but it's a safety thing for the intersection(s). We are going to be changing the bulbs from incandescent to LED, which will be much more reliable for the intersection(s) and help eliminate some overtime."

ELECTRIC DEPARTMENT: Power Plant/Production Update

General: Superintendent Schneider reported the production crew is still doing required reports, and the guys are still doing generator maintenance.

Planning for 2016: Superintendent Schneider stated, "Dee (Senior Plant Operator Francis) and I are planning our yearly maintenance and repair schedule - setting priorities, and scheduling repairs around the summer season."

Personnel: Superintendent Schneider reported he has been working on work plans for Electric Department personnel and will get them to his committee to look over.

Safety Training: Personnel attended the KMU sponsored safety training on Tuesday.

WATER DEPARTMENT: Distribution Update

General: Personnel have been doing normal duties: work orders, line locates and other general duties like reading meters, doing rereads, customer requests, and attended KMU safety training.

Fire Hydrant Repair: Personnel repaired a fire hydrant in front of Crow-Moddie Ford on the south end of town. They were able to just reboot it, put new mega-lugs on it, and put it back in.

Sewer Lagoons - Brush Burn: Superintendent Hawkins reported, "I want to thank Kevin (Superintendent Boyce). He went down and burned off the grass and brush at the Sewer Lagoons."

Meter Installations: Superintendent Hawkins reported, "We've been working on water meter installs. We had service off to the Life Care Center for a little while when we had the meter out of the ground. Besides that, we've been putting in 3/4" and 1" meters around town."

Grease Trap Inspections: Superintendent Hawkins stated, "It's that favorite time of the year when all the businesses love to see me drive up. This is when I visit local businesses to do my grease trap inspections. It will take a little time because I'll also be performing my other duties, including analysis at the Water Treatment Plant."

WATER DEPARTMENT: Production Update

Water Treatment Plant - Sludge Removal and Filters: Superintendent Hawkins said, "We are still gathering costs at the Water Treatment Plant. We're working internally to get things ready for budgeting into 2017. We did get our new filter blower and got it installed. We cleaned out all of our sludge pits within the plant, and we got our backwash holding basin cleaned out. We did start up our sludge press, and are trying presses again to see if we can get that to work. We've been talking to U.S. Filter on that."

Water Pumped: A daily average of 450,000 gallons of water is being pumped.

STREET DEPARTMENT: Update

Superintendent Mast is attending a concrete conference in Kansas City (American Concrete Pavement Association). Council Member Curtiss read the Street Department update.

General: Street Department employees have been installing culverts for a new house, helped the Parks Department with the parking lot at the new dog park (Happy Tails), and constructed head walls for culverts at County Club Heights to stop erosion problems there.

POLICE DEPARTMENT: Update

General: Chief Jones reported that it has been pretty much normal calls and they are staying busy.

Officer Alex Kough: Chief Jones reported that Alex Kough, our newest officer, started his training on the 22nd of February. He has successfully met the conditions to be eligible to submit his paperwork to Kansas Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training (CPOST). His provisional certificate was in today's mail; and Chief Jones expects to hear within the next few days from Kansas Law Enforcement Training Center when Alex's start date at the Academy will be.

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Officer Blake Hanson: Officer Hanson will graduate from the KLETC Academy on the 18th of March. He is anxious to come home and get to work, but he says he is doing well.

Vehicles - Dodge Chargers (update): Chief Jones stated, "We went to Topeka and picked up the car (2014 Dodge Charger) on Monday. The upfitter in Emporia, KCOM, was ready for it; so we took it straight to Emporia and brought Unit 12 (also a 2014 Charger) home and put it right into service."

Animal Shelter - Gravel Improvements by Street Department: Chief Jones said, "I want to thank Doug, Mark, and their crew. They gave us some new gravel for in front of the animal shelter; and in the dog pens out back they put down a base and then a layer of nice fine gravel. It really makes a nice difference out there; and from what we've been getting from the State and some other entities, this will help significantly on keeping disease down out there because we don't have the grass retaining urine, feces, and like that. We just got it done today. If you have a chance, take a look. Among other things, it makes it look huge back there."

Nuisance Property: General: Chief Jones reported, "We've had some contact with several people around town about properties. I served one guy with a ten-days notice for two of his properties, and within fifteen minutes of him getting served, he was on the phone with me inquiring what he needs to do to get it taken care of. I have also sent out some other contacts, including some courtesy letters to some other property owners - including the one that's out of state, addressing that we have concerns and that we need to find out what their intentions are to abate their nuisance properties. It's a continuing process."

Nuisance Property: 312 Neosho/window covering, etc: Chief Jones reported, "Jimmy (Zoning Clerk Hugunin) has had positive contact with Dani Birk on the old Johnson's Pharmacy building. You may have noticed, it wasn't but a day or so after we talked about it last meeting, that plastic split. Dani has promised that she will take care of it in a good manner." Zoning Clerk Hugunin, "I believe she said she had a contractor coming in Monday."

PARKS DEPARTMENT: Update

General: Parks personnel have been doing normal duties, cleaning public buildings and public restrooms, and doing building and equipment maintenance on inclement days. The wind has been blowing a lot of trash around, so they have been picking up trash. They have also been picking up tree branches. Windscreens at the Jones Park tennis court were blown down, and were zip-tied back up.

Parks Department Sign: Superintendent Boyce reported, "We have been working on the Parks Department sign in front of the building - stripping it down, repainting the trees and lettering, and resealing the wood."

Tractor and Mower (update): The new tractor and mower are here.

RV Camping - Pay Stations: Superintendent Boyce said, "We started working on the posts that will be holding the signs and the roof over the fee collection stations at the City Dam/Drake Park and Kelley Park."

Personnel: Superintendent Boyce has been working on employee evaluations and work plans.

CLAIMS 2016-05: Council Member Lenard, "I move City of Burlington pay Claims Ordinance 2016-05 in the amount of \$108,332.34 for payment of city bills." Council Member Griffith, "Second." Mayor Luke called for discussion. City Clerk Kewley stated, "Larger items tonight are: Brenntag Southwest: \$2,753.20; Kansas Highway Patrol: \$19,000; Knight Trucking: \$9,744.33." **Hearing no additional discussion, Mayor Luke instructed City Clerk Kewley to poll Council for a vote. All votes were in favor. Mayor Luke declared Claims Ordinance 2016-05 approved by unanimous vote, 6:0.**

PAYROLL 2016-04: Council Member Lenard stated, "I move City of Burlington pay Payroll Ordinance 2016-04 in the amount of \$76,589.40." Council Member Hall, "Second." Hearing no further discussion, Mayor Luke instructed City Clerk Kewley to poll Council for a vote. All votes were in favor. Mayor Luke declared Payroll Ordinance 2016-04 approved by unanimous vote, 6:0.

FINANCE: Employee Salaries / Consumer Price Index & Resolution 2016-02

CPI Discussion: City Clerk Kewley stated, "Last week on February 25th at 3 o'clock, we had our Finance Committee meeting. We did get the CPI this year from the index of CPI-W. We get it from the same place at the same time every year. This year, it is a 1.2% increase. Tonight the Finance Committee is recommending the Consumer Price Index increase of 1.2%, through the CPI-W." City Clerk Kewley requested a motion.

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Council Member Griffith stated, "I move to approve a 1.2% Consumer Price Index increase to City of Burlington employees beginning April 2nd, 2016." Council Member Hall, "I'll second." Mayor Luke called for discussion. He explained, "For those of you who haven't been through this before, this is the increase associated with the cost of living. It has nothing to do with merit increases or anything else involved with our employee evaluations that are due within the next couple of weeks. The CPI is the standard cost of living adjustment." Council Member Lenard inquired, "How many years have we had this standard?" City Clerk Kewley answered, "In here, back in the 1990s; probably twenty years or more." Council Member Lenard, "The same rate?" Mayor Luke, "No. We go to the same index every year." City Clerk Kewley, "It keeps our wages consistent with the economy." **Hearing no additional discussion, Mayor Luke called for a vote. Motion unanimously carried, 6:0.**

Resolution 2016-02: Mayor Luke explained the purpose of the proposed resolution, and called for a motion. **Council Member Lenard made the motion, "I move to adopt Resolution 2016-02, Providing For and Fixing Salaries and Compensations of Officers and Employees of the City of Burlington, Kansas pursuant to the Personnel Policies and Guidelines Established by the City of Burlington, Kansas in 1996, as presented." Council Member Tschantz, "I'll second that." Hearing no discussion, Mayor Luke called for a vote. Motion unanimously carried, 6:0. Mayor Luke declared Resolution 2016-02 approved unanimously.**

PLANNING & ZONING: Update

General: Zoning Clerk Hugunin updated Facebook and the webpage, and worked on several permits.

312 Neosho - Update: Zoning Clerk Hugunin, "As the Chief said, I did talk to Dani Birk, and she hopes to have her contractor down here Monday to start getting those windows taken care of."

Census Bureau - Annual Housing update: Zoning Clerk Hugunin has been working on getting the annual housing update done for the Census Bureau.

Meetings: Zoning Clerk Hugunin said he is planning a meeting of the Burlington Tree Board, and also a meeting of the Burlington Planning Commission.

OTHER BUSINESS - Kansas Municipal Energy Agency - Board of Director #2 Appointment

Mayor Luke explained, "This is a continual appointment done every two years. I have been Director #2 for the last eight years." **Council Member Griffith stated, "I move to appoint Stan Luke as Burlington's Director #2 to the KMEA Board of Directors, to serve a two-year term from May 1, 2016 to April 30, 2018." Council Member Lenard, "Second." Hearing no discussion, Mayor Luke called for a vote. Motion carried unanimously, 6:0.** Mayor Luke stated, "I just have to attend if Alan is not there." (Alan Schneider, Electric Superintendent, is Director #1 until April 1, 2017. It is also a two-year term.)

PERMITS: Permits issued by Zoning Clerk Hugunin: None

LEGAL DEPARTMENT: Update on Industrial Park Easements and Raymers' purchase in progress

Raymers' Purchase: City Attorney Robrahn stated, "We are still slowly moving on our real estate transaction in Industrial Park #1 (Reserve #1). Jimmy is going to try to locate some mapping for Raymers." Zoning Clerk Hugunin, "Yes, Nancy got that today. I think everything should be done Friday. I think they should be in here Friday, also." Attorney Robrahn, "Actually, I'm kind of glad it got slowed down a little because we got a call from the Register of Deeds that we needed to add to our legal description in our easement, so we can get that done." Zoning Clerk Hugunin, "They had a legal description we weren't aware of, which was a more in-depth description." Attorney Robrahn thought the description in the warranty deed would also need changed.

Prepare/Record Easements for other property: Attorney Robrahn stated, "I told Jimmy it might not be a bad idea if we go ahead and do an easement on the rest of the property we own so we will have something on record in case questions about an easement arise in the future for a property sale or anything else." Mayor Luke, "You can look up those properties anytime." Attorney Robrahn, "Yes, I told Jimmy, when he gets some free time we can do that." Zoning Clerk Hugunin, "I looked at it, and we pretty much just have the Industrial Park left; and I think it's platted."

CITY CLERK: Update

General: City Clerk Kewley reported City Hall personnel have been busy with customers paying utility bills. They have been preparing work orders, vouchers for bill paying, payroll, and the meeting minutes for tonight, and have been handling normal calls and inquiries.

Meetings: City Clerk Kewley the Finance Committee meeting on February 25th. She also participated in the bid opening for the street sweeper last week.

Employee Evaluations due March 16th: City Clerk Kewley stated, "I want to remind you the employee evaluations and work plans are to be completed by March 16th, including the Superintendents."
